

MAYOR PRESENTS JULY AWARD OF EXCELLENCE

Mayor Chris Beutler today presented the Mayor's Award of Excellence for July to Bryan Kratochvil of Lincoln Fire and Rescue (LFR). The monthly award recognizes City employees who consistently provide exemplary service and work that demonstrates personal commitment to the City. The award was presented at the beginning of today's City Council meeting.

Kratochvil is a Fire Apparatus Operator and has worked for the City since 2000. LFR Captain Bob Watton nominated him in the categories of safety, productivity and customer relations for his dedication to LFR and the community. Watton said Kratochvil has gone beyond his normal work duties, working with Tabitha Healthcare Services to use five houses they were going to demolish for training.

An example of his community spirit is the action Kratochvil took after responding to a recent call from a family needing medical assistance. While at the home, Kratochvil noticed it was in desperate need of painting. The single mother who lives there has three children with autism and a fourth with severe dyslexia. Through talking with the woman, Kratochvil realized the same family had suffered a fire two years earlier, in which one of the children was rescued.

Over the next four months, Kratochvil organized a house-painting event. He found businesses and individuals willing to donate products and time to replace the gutters, paint the house and plant some shrubs. The Lincoln Firefighter Benefit Association donated most of the funds, and Kratochvil recruited about 50 volunteers for the two-day event in April. Watton wrote that Kratochvil hasn't sought recognition, he "has just done this out of the goodness of his heart."

The other categories in which employees can be nominated are loss prevention and valor. Consideration also may be given to nominations that demonstrate self-initiated accomplishments or those completed outside of the nominee's job description. All City employees are eligible for the Mayor's Award of Excellence except for elected and appointed officials. Individuals or teams can be nominated by supervisors, peers, subordinates and the general public.

Nomination forms are available on the City Web site at lincoln.ne.gov (keyword: personnel) or from department heads, employee bulletin boards or the Personnel Department, which oversees the awards program.

All nominations are reviewed by the Mayor's Award of Excellence Committee, which includes a representative with each union and a non-union representative appointed by the Mayor. Award winners receive a \$100 U.S. savings bond, a day off with pay and a plaque. Monthly winners are eligible to receive the annual award, which comes with a \$500 U.S. savings bond, two days off with pay and a plaque.

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Washington Report

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SENATE JOINS HOUSE FOR SUMMER RECESS

CONGRESS

Senate joins House for month-long summer recess. With the House adjourning last week, Senators had the Capitol Hill spotlight all to themselves, as leadership in that chamber worked to complete some high priority items before leaving town until after Labor Day.

First and foremost, Senators formally approved the nomination of Judge Sonia Sotomayor to the United States Supreme Court yesterday. The outcome was not in doubt, as Republicans had indicated that they would not try to use parliamentary tactics to delay or hold up the nomination. The final tally was 68-31, with 9 Republicans joining all chamber Democrats in voting in favor. Senator Edward Kennedy (D-MA) was absent for the vote due to illness.

The Senate also approved its fourth FY 2010 appropriations bill this week, the measure governing programs at the Department of Agriculture. Senate leaders intend to spend a great deal of floor time in September on the annual spending bills. While completion of action on all 12 FY 2010 measures prior to the start of the new fiscal year on October 1 is doubtful, Democrats in Congress are still working to avoid delays that have resulted in “omnibus” budget packages of recent years. The House has approved all 12 of its FY 2010 spending bills and is waiting for Senate approval on each in order to convene conference committees to reconcile differences in the bills.

Finally, the Senate also cleared legislation that would extend the Consumer Assistance to Recycle and Save Program, commonly known as “cash for clunkers.” The automobile rebate program has been popular with consumers and would have run out of funds in August if the \$2 billion infusion had not been made.

Both the House and Senate are scheduled to return to legislative business on September 8.

The following are some pending issues that might be of interest should local officials be meeting with their Members of Congress while they are in their districts:

Transportation Reauthorization

Both the House and Senate have approved legislation (HR 3357) to keep the Highway Trust Fund solvent through September. No Member-directed projects were included in the measure. There are still disagreements over an 18-month extension (preferred by the White House and Senate) and a six-year extension (preferred by the House) of the 2005 SAFETEA-LU law that expires on October 1. See July 31 *Washington Report* for additional details. There have been reports that the House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee will markup its six-year reauthorization bill during the week of September 8, with floor consideration coming by the third week of September.

Climate Change

The Senate is expected to take up a climate change bill in September, and local government organizations are seeking support for proposals to provide funds in the measure for the Energy Efficiency and Conservation Block Grant, as well as local transportation initiatives that lower greenhouse gas emissions. The bill approved by the House

earlier this year contains no funding for the EECBG and a small amount for transportation. See June 26 [Washington Report](#) for additional details.

Health Care

Members are expected to hear about this initiative the most over the next month, and thus far, local governments have been focused on ensuring that items such as prevention and wellness and community health centers that are currently in the House bill remain in the final version. See July 17 [Washington Report](#) for additional details.

Hotel Taxes

Legislation to promote overseas travel to the United States is likely to be one of the first items of business in the Senate when they return. State and local governments are opposing a proposed amendment to the bill that would allow online travel companies to continue a practice of remitting state and local sales taxes on the whole sale price rather than the retail price when they purchase hotel rooms from local hotels for resale on their websites. See related story below for additional details.

FINANCE

Senate tourism promotion bill may face hotel tax amendment. Senate leaders scrapped plans to bring legislation (S 1023) to the floor this week that is designed to promote international travel to the United States, but have agreed that it will be their first item of business upon their return to Washington on September 8.

When the bill is brought to the floor in September, an amendment is expected that would preempt state and local taxing authority over online travel companies such as Travelocity. Typically, the online travel companies will purchase rooms from hotels at discounted rates, and then sell them to consumers at a higher rate. The online travel companies then remit a tax to states and local governments at the discounted rate, rather than the rate at which they sell the room to consumers.

Some states and local governments have taken collection actions against the online travel companies to end this practice and over 40 court cases are pending across the country. In response, the online travel companies have been seeking legislative

relief on the issue, and have reportedly found a champion this year in Senator John Ensign (R-NV), who has plans to introduce the preemption amendment when the bill is considered on the floor in September. A coalition of state and local government interests are asking localities to urge their Senators to vote against any amendment that may preempt local taxing authority.

The Travel Promotion Act of 2009 would establish a quasi-governmental Corporation for Travel Promotion to “provide useful information to people interested in traveling to the United States, counter and correct misperceptions regarding U.S. entry policy, and promote U.S. travel.” The measure is a priority of Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid (D-NV), who sees the bill as helpful to his home state of Nevada.

JOB TRAINING

Senate panel approves FY 2010 Labor budget. Last week, the Senate Appropriations Committee approved its version of an FY 2010 appropriations bill with jurisdiction over the Department of Labor. Without taking stimulus funding into account, most programs at the Employment and Training Administration would be funded at or near their FY 2009 levels.

Senate recommended funding for selected programs include (with comparison to FY 2009 levels and House FY 2010 levels):

- \$861 million for adult training (same as FY09 and House FY10)
- \$924 million for youth training (same as FY09 and House)
- \$1.18 billion for dislocated worker assistance (same as FY09 and House)
- \$105 million for Youthbuild (+\$35m FY09; +\$5m House)
- \$115 million for Prisoner Re-Entry Programs (+\$7m FY09 and House)
- \$575 million for Community Service Employment for Older Americans (+\$3m FY09; -\$40m House)

The Senate bill also includes \$40 million for a new Green Jobs Innovation Fund,

which would provide competitive grants for programs that provide job training in green industry sectors. The House recommended \$45 million for the program.

The full Senate is expected to take up the FY 2010 Labor Department spending bill when it returns from its summer recess in September.

HUMAN SERVICES

FY 2010 HHS budget recommendations made by Senate committee. The Senate Appropriations Committee made its recommendations last week for the FY 2010 budget for the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS). Like many domestic discretionary programs this cycle, the panel has provided funding at or near FY 2009 levels in most cases, not counting the funds some programs received in the stimulus bill.

Recommended funding for selected programs include (with comparison to FY 2009 levels and House FY 2010 levels):

- \$2.19 billion for community health centers (same as FY09 and House FY10)
- \$2.27 billion for Ryan White AIDS programs (+\$40m FY09; -\$20m House)
- \$3.32 billion for child vaccinations (-\$50m FY09 and House)
- \$662 million for the Maternal and Child Health Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$102 million for the Preventative Health Care Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$399 million for the Mental Health Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$1.7 billion for the Social Services Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$2.1 billion for the Child Care Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$700 million for the Community Services Block Grant (same as FY09 and House)
- \$1.74 billion for the Substance Abuse Block Grant (+\$40m FY09 and House)

- \$5.1 billion for the low income home energy assistance program (same as FY09 and House)
- \$7.2 billion for Head Start (+\$100m FY09; same as House)
- \$97 million for runaway and homeless youth (same as FY09 and House)
- \$127 million for family violence (same as FY09 and House)
- \$1.49 billion for Aging Administration programs (-\$100m FY09; -\$40m House)
- \$190 million for environmental health programs (+\$5m FY09; -\$1m House)
- \$105 million for Healthy Start (+\$3m FY09; same as House)
- \$730 million for refugee assistance programs (+\$15m FY09; same as House)

TRANSPORTATION

Members of Senate Banking Committee introduce "Livable Communities Act."

This week, Chairman Chris Dodd (D-CT) of the Senate Committee on Banking, Housing, and Urban Affairs, along with four Democratic colleagues on the panel, introduced the Livable Communities Act. The committee has jurisdiction over federal transit programs as well as the Department of Housing and Urban Development.

The measure is designed to assist local governments in coordinating housing, transportation, and environmental policies. Bill sponsors believe that utilizing this "sustainable development" will help ease congestion in and around communities, reduce greenhouse gas emissions and fuel consumption, and preserve open space.

The Livable Communities Act would create a new Livable Communities Grant program to help communities develop and implement their sustainable development plans, which would include competitive planning grants (\$400 million over four years) and challenge grants for program implementation (\$3.75 billion over three years). These grants would address public transportation, pedestrian and bicycle thoroughfares, affordable housing, transit-oriented development, and brownfield redevelopment.

The bill would also create an Interagency Council on Sustainable Communities, which would include representatives from the Departments of Transportation (DOT) and Housing and Urban Development (HUD), and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). This Council would coordinate federal sustainable development policies. Furthermore, an Office of Sustainable Housing and Communities would be established at HUD to oversee the Livable Communities Grant program and provide technical assistance.

STIMULUS WATCH

Environmental Protection Agency

EPA announced the communities that will receive supplemental funding for brownfields revolving loan fund grants to help communities carry out cleanup activities, redevelopment projects, and create jobs for local residents living near brownfields sites. The grants include \$42 million from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) and \$13 million from FY 2009 EPA brownfields general program funding:

MAYOR PROMOTES SCHOOL SAFETY

With school beginning Wednesday, August 19, Mayor Chris Beutler today promoted two efforts aimed at getting students to and from school safely:

- The Lincoln Public Schools (LPS), the City's Public Works and Utilities Department and the Lincoln Police Department (LPD) are sponsoring the annual "Safe Walk and Safe Ride to School Night" from 6 to 7 p.m. Monday, August 17. All 25 mph school speed zones will be in operation. (Some schools will have the "Safe Ride" event with school buses on Tuesday, August 18.)
- LPD will conduct its two-week "back to school" traffic enforcement project beginning Wednesday, August 19. Additional officers will be posted around schools to promote traffic and pedestrian safety.

"Drivers in the areas of the three new schools will need to be prepared for increased vehicle and pedestrian traffic," Mayor Beutler said. "As school begins, it's important for all of us to use extra caution on the road, especially in school zones." The three new schools are Kooser Elementary at N. 14th St. and Alvo Road; Arnold Elementary at N.W. 48th and W. Cuming streets; and Schoo Middle School at Tallgrass Parkway and Penrose Drive.

Goodrich Middle School students will now be in attendance at the Dawes Middle School on Colfax Avenue and 52nd Street. With more buses and less vehicular traffic expected, the City has designated Colfax Avenue between 49th and 52nd streets as one-way westbound from 7 to 8 a.m. and 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.. Signs have been posted.

Voluntary one-way pick-up and drop-off driving plans and recommended walking routes are available from school principals; the LPS Web site at lps.org; and the City Web site at lincoln.ne.gov (keyword: schools). If a plan has not been developed for your school, please contact the principal.

Pedestrians are encouraged to walk, not run, when crossing streets. Motorists are encouraged to pay attention to the signage in school areas. (A list follows this release).

LPD has a “no tolerance” policy for enforcing the 25 mph school speed zones, and fines are doubled for speeding in these zones. The fines (not including court costs) for speeding in a 25 mph school speed zone are:

- \$20 for traveling 1 to 5 mph over the speed limit
- \$50 for traveling 6 to 10 mph over the speed limit
- \$150 for traveling 11 to 15 mph over the speed limit
- \$250 for traveling 16 to 20 mph over the speed limit
- \$400 for traveling 21 mph or more over the speed limit

SCHOOL AREA SIGNAGE

No Parking 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. School Days Loading Zone

These signs are installed in areas designated for picking up and dropping off students. Drivers can legally park in these areas for 10 minutes as long as they remain in their vehicles.

No Parking 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. School Days Bus Zone

These signs are installed in areas designated for school bus loading and unloading. Drivers are prohibited from using these areas when they are picking up or dropping off students.

No Stopping Anytime

These signs are installed in areas for safety reasons, and drivers are prohibited from stopping in these areas to pick up or drop off students.

No Stopping 2 p.m. to 4 p.m. School Days or No Stopping 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. School Days

These signs are the same as the “No Stopping Anytime” signs except that they are only in effect during the times stated.

Authorized School Crossing

These signs are installed at locations where drivers should expect to see concentrations of children crossing the street. Crossings adjacent to schools also usually have “No Stopping Anytime” signs nearby to allow drivers to better see the children approaching or standing at the curb.

CITY-COUNTY EMPLOYEES MAKE 2009 FOOD BANK DRIVE A SUCCESS

Mayor Chris Beutler and Lancaster County Commission Chair Bernie Heier today commended City and County employees for donating more than 15,460 pounds of food and personal items and \$12,570 to the Food Bank for Lincoln. Food Bank Director Scott Young said the annual City-County Food Bank Drive is a key part of the annual Campaign Against Hunger.

“The Campaign Against Hunger is our largest food drive of the year,” said Young. “The City and County employees are one of our anchors for the whole drive. They always demonstrate great leadership, energy and enthusiasm for reaching out to their fellow citizens with a great effort for the Food Bank. Their work will feed hundreds of families and individuals at a time when the need is greater than ever.”

“We see more participation in our food bank drive every year,” said co-campaign coordinators Larry Williams and Minette Genuchi in a joint statement. “We have outstanding support from department directors and elected officials and a great network of department coordinators and volunteers. Attendance at our Food Bank Picnic was up, and we believe we set a new record in the total amount of food and money collected. It was a great effort across the board for a tremendous cause.”

Williams and Genuchi said a great example of effort was in the Engineering Services Division of the City Public Works and Utilities Department. About 200 division employees collected more than 6,600 pounds of food and more than \$1,500 in cash.

Results from other departments and divisions include the following:

- The City Parks and Recreation Department collected more than 1,580 pounds of food.
- The City-County Health Department collected three barrels of food and about \$1,580.
- The Urban Development Department collected two barrels of food and \$480 in cash.

The Finance Department collected four large boxes of food and personal items and about \$724 in cash, including about \$389 from their bake sale.


