Animal Control and Public Health

There is a direct connection between what we do in Animal Control and our overall Public Health Mission to “Protect and Promote the Public’s Health”

Injury Prevention – Bite Prevention

Rabies Prevention – Pet Licensing and Vaccinations

Disease Control – Zoonotic Diseases and Wildlife

Responding to Community Needs

Fiscal Year 2016:

- Animal Control dispatchers received over 50,000 calls from the public.
- Officers were dispatched on over 24,000 calls.
- Last year Lincoln pet owners licensed and vaccinated nearly 64,000 dogs and cats.

Officers in the Field

Fiscal Year 2016:

- Animal Control officers responded to 547 bites and 58 attacks.
- Officers investigated 824 neglect calls.
(dogs left in cars; animals without adequate food, water, and shelter; and cruelty cases)
- Animal Control responded to 718 wildlife calls.
(bats, raccoons, opossums, and deer)
- 2,121 dead animals (domestic and wildlife) were picked up.

Officers in the Field

Fiscal Year 2016:

- 101 dogs were declared potentially dangerous.
- 30 dogs were declared dangerous.
- Officers issued 15,361 defect or warning tickets.
(mostly for license renewals)
- Officers wrote 490 citations for violations of Lincoln Municipal Code.
- 129 permits were issued for fowl/small and large animal, pet shops/groom shops/mobile groom shops, multi-cat household permits.

Permits: Fowl/Small and Large Animal, Pet Shops/Groom Shops/ Mobile Groom Shops, Multi-cat Household Permits

Indicator: “100% of permit applicants will receive an Animal Control Officer contact within 14 days of issuance of the permit.”

Multi-cat Households

Non-compliant Owners of Dangerous Dogs

Indicator: “By the end of the year (calendar year), 75% of all pet owners owning a dangerous dog will be in compliance with Lincoln Municipal Code requirements.”

- In 2015, the compliance was 69%.
- In 2016 (year to date), the compliance is 57%.

Non-compliant Owners of Potentially Dangerous Dogs

Indicator: “By the end of the year (calendar year), 65% of all pet owners owning a potentially dangerous dog will be in compliance with Lincoln Municipal Code requirements.”

- In 2015, the compliance was 57%.
- In 2016 (year to date), the compliance is 54%.



Decrease the rate of humans injured by dog bites requiring an emergency room visit to less than 60 incidents (per 100,000 population)




Bite Reports

Indicator: “Increase to 90% the Animal Control Officer (ACO) bite reports that are submitted to dispatch in 48 hours.”

- In FY 2016, 66% of the ACO bite reports were submitted to dispatch in 48 hours.

Increase Pet License Sales by 3 percent each year




Pet License Defect Resolution
