Join us for a box lunch and a fascinating historical program by some of Lincoln's favorite historians. Seating is limited.



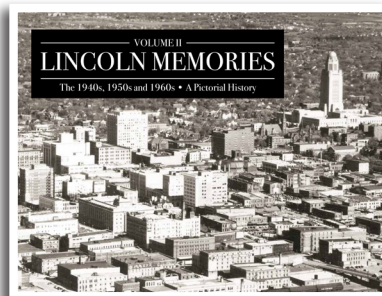
- **Wednesday, April 26 – Jim McKee**
“Bethany: Nebraska Christian University/ Cotner College”

Old timers will remember the five story castle-like building that stood on North Cotner, but how many remember it was Nebraska Christian University, later to become Cotner University and finally Cotner College? Bethany Heights grew up around it just as College View grew up around Union College; Normal, Nebraska grew out of Western Normal School; and University Place developed around Nebraska Wesleyan. Only luck and timing brought the demise of Cotner College and left Union College and Nebraska Wesleyan standing to this day.
