The City Council votes on changes to the Mayor's recommended budget at 5:30 p.m.


Monday, Aug. 22

ANNUAL OPERATING BUDGET

Mayor Recommended

Dear Citizens of Lincoln,

What do you want Lincoln to be?

That is the question we had to consider as we developed the City of Lincoln budget for 2011-12.

Lincoln's national accolades for being a great place to live and do business continue. Most recently, The Street, a financial website, named Lincoln one of the "10 cities that embody the American dream." Our investment in our future is paying huge dividends.

Now, we face a tough challenge. How do we conquer the General Fund budget's \$9.3 million deficit without jeopardizing all we have accomplished together?

Recently, I released an "all cuts" budget scenario that showed what would have to happen in order to balance the budget by relying solely on program cuts. Over 90 parks, seven pools and three libraries would close. Our senior citizens would face a deep reduction in services that keep them active and living independently. People who need public transportation for work and school would see sharply reduced StarTran hours.

All these cuts would occur on top of four years of already difficult reductions: 116 jobs (5.2% of the City workforce) and \$4.5 million in service reductions.

I could not in good conscience so fundamentally diminish the quality of our community. Lincoln simply means too much to me personally not to make the tough choices. The Mayor's budget for 2011-12 fixes the budget's structural imbalance, putting us in a much better position for the future. It places \$7 million a year into street rehabilitation and new construction to help speed traffic and support job creation.

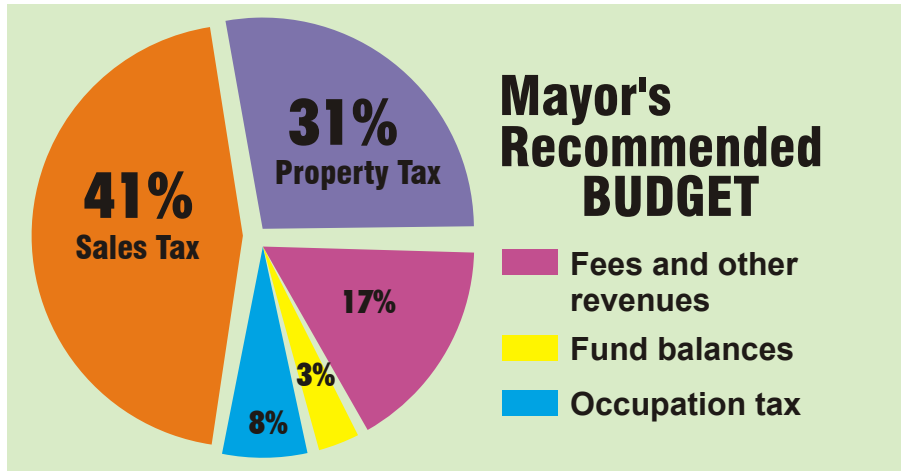
My budget is a balanced and common sense solution that addresses the realities of our situation. It also puts us on the right track to continue the excellence that is reflected in not only our national rankings, but in the optimism of our citizens for the future.

This year's budget is a 2.66% increase over the 2010-2011 budget of \$140,188,072.

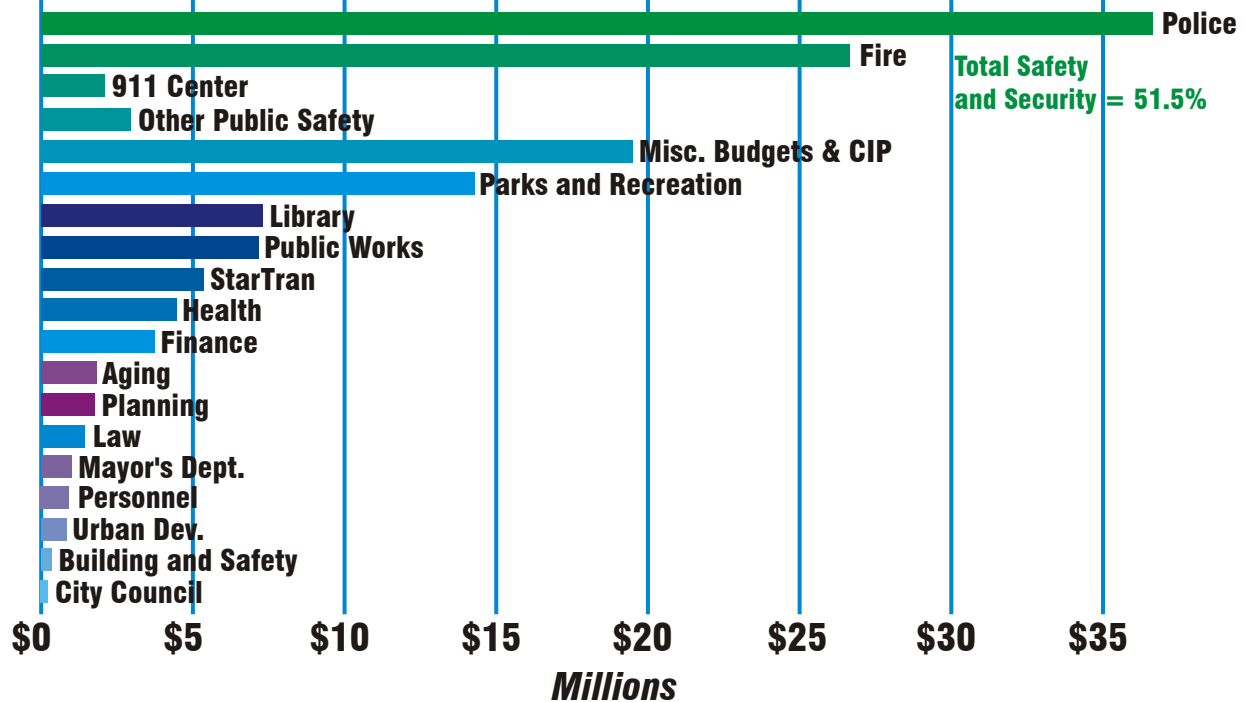

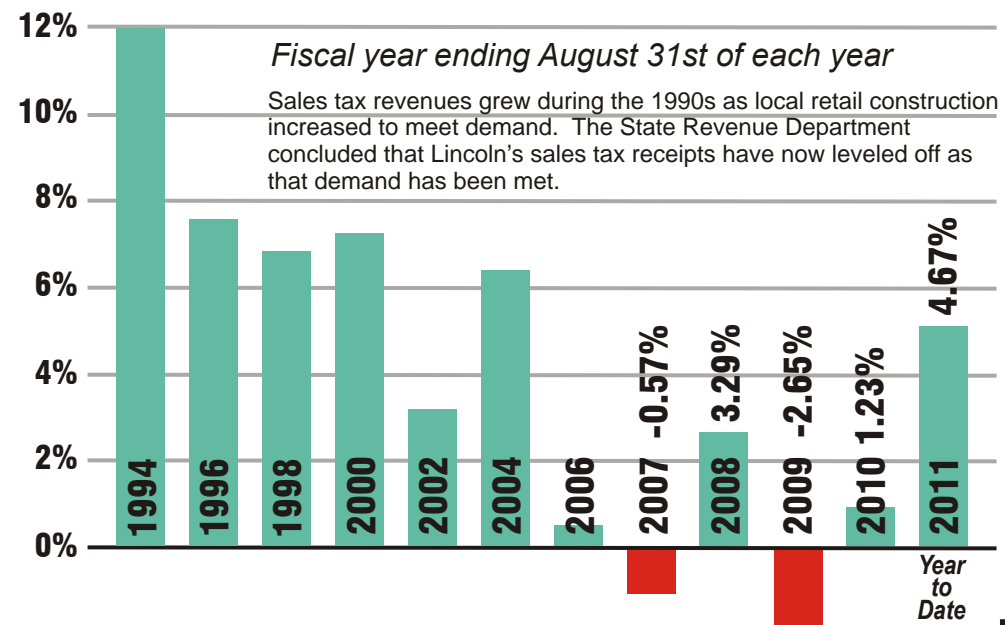
TAX DOLLARS BY DEPARTMENT

2011-2012 Mayor's Recommended Budget

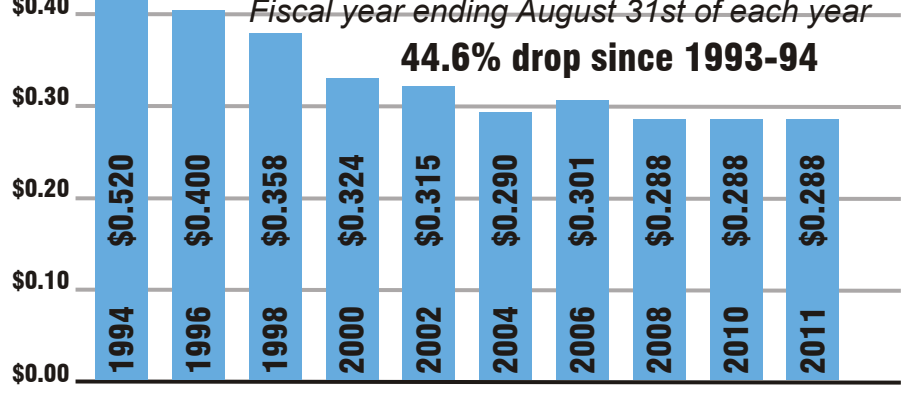

DECLINING/FLAT SALES TAX GROWTH

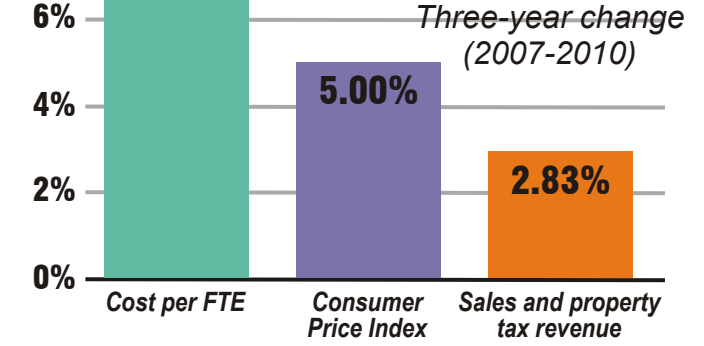


DECLINING/FLAT PROPERTY TAX RATE

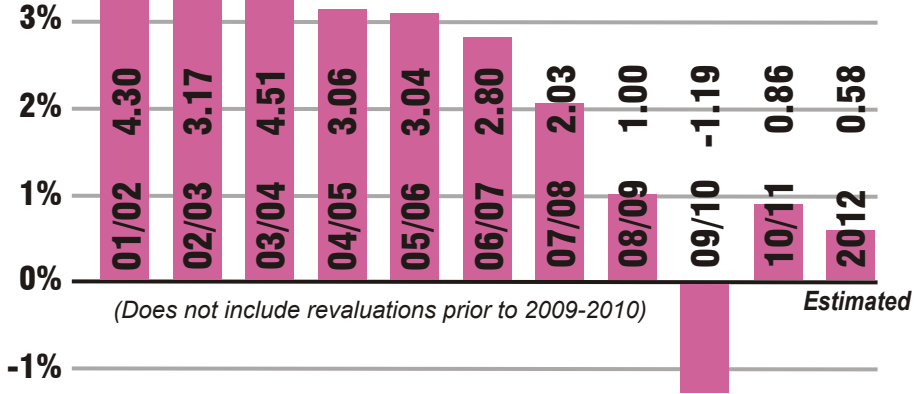


All increases since 1994-95 have been for voter-approved bond issues.

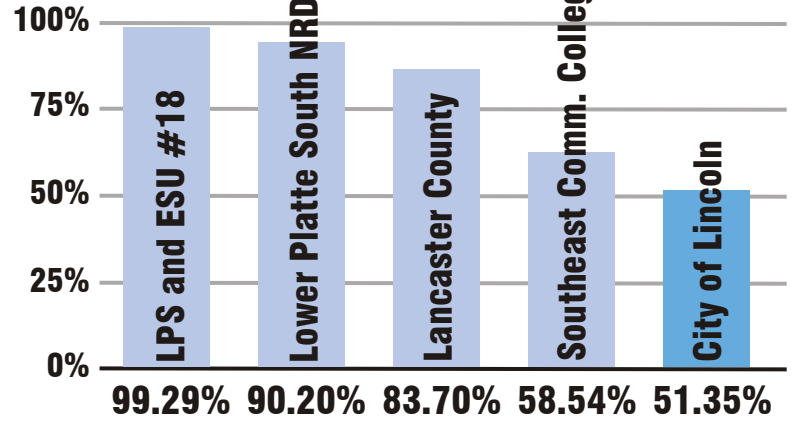
EMPLOYEE COSTS ARE OUTPACING REVENUE GROWTH AND INFLATION



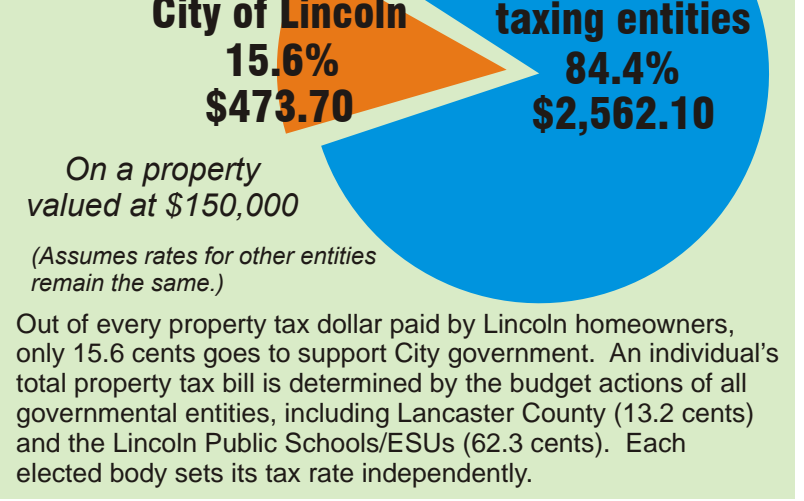
DECLINING/FLAT GROWTH IN PROPERTY TAX BASE

MAYOR'S PROPOSALS:

Cuts/Efficiencies: \$2.14 million

- Close Air Park Fire Station as part of overall relocation program - \$458,057
- Reorganize Library staff and close all libraries for one-half day - \$457,000
- Reduce Public Works and Utilities General Fund expenses - \$341,000
- Reduce StarTran Saturday service from 12 to 8 hours - \$201,923
- Reduce Lincoln Partnership for Economic Development match - \$200,000
- Eliminate Aging's Retired Senior Volunteer Program - \$149,016
- Reorganize Finance Department - \$126,400
- Cut Forestry position - \$70,354

CITY COUNCIL'S PROPOSED CHANGES TO MAYOR'S RECOMMENDED BUDGET

- Restore Friday and Sunday library hours with \$264,683 from *cash reserve fund and \$28,985 from Lancaster County - total \$293,668.
- Add \$1 million to Parks Capital Improvement Program (CIP) from two sources:
 - Transfer \$748,000 from the street construction CIP to snow removal, freeing General Fund money for Parks.
 - Transfer \$252,000 from *cash reserve fund.
- Restore funding for Air Park Fire Station with \$447,242 from *cash reserve fund and transfer of \$400,000 in Lincoln Fire and Rescue's miscellaneous contractual costs to personnel costs.

* The cash reserve fund includes \$2.2 million – \$1.7 million from anticipated Verizon settlement and \$500,000 from LES cost shift. Council proposals would use \$963,925.

- Eliminate Police response to non-emergencies - \$59,182
- Reduce Healthy Homes minority outreach - \$30,000
- Reorganize Public Safety - \$29,063
- Eliminate winter hours at Pioneers Park Nature Center - \$16,902

Revenue increase: \$4.0 million

- Increase the City property tax levy to 31.6 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation from the current 28.8 cents. The increase would be \$3.49 more per month for the owner of a home valued at \$150,000. The increase would have a 1.38 percent impact on your total property tax bill - \$4.0 million (Covers loss of State aid, \$1.8 million; increased cost of Police and Fire Pension, \$1.1 million; voter-approved stormwater bond \$400,000; CIR case, \$500,000; inflation, \$200,000)

Fund Shift: \$3.2 million

- Shift General Fund expenses for street lights and related items to Lincoln Electric System (*\$2.7 million for General Fund, *\$500,000 for cash reserve fund)

User Fees/Cost Recovery: \$1 million

- User fee cost recovery, rate increases (Parks and Recreation and Health departments), parking administrative fee increase and other revenue changes.

ADMINISTRATION'S PROPOSED CHANGES TO BUDGET

- Return \$1.7 million street light cost to General Fund, to be funded with \$1.7 million in LES Return of Equity Revenue.
- Miscellaneous reductions in tax-funded budget - \$96,946.
- Increase funding for S.W. 40th Viaduct by \$3 million in CIP, to be funded with additional \$3 million appropriation from Railroad Transportation Safety District - no impact on tax-funded budget.
- Miscellaneous reductions in non-tax funds - \$21,000.

This revenue funds the continuation of these services:

- More than 90 City parks
- Six Police Officers, four Public Safety Officers and three Victim/Witness Advocates
- Seven pools
- Three neighborhood libraries
- StarTran mid-day weekday service and most Saturday service
- Aging Partners services
- Most Pioneers Park Nature Center services

Street construction and repair:

\$3.9 million

- Additional LES shift - *\$2.7 million
- \$10 wheel tax increase - \$1.2 million

Wheel tax increases of \$5 in 2012-13 and 2013-14 would increase rehabilitation funds to \$4.1 million in 2014-2015.

* Total LES shift about \$6 million
