Map – showing color coded trails with mileage for each segment, stream crossings with notes on crossings not appropriate for specific users, points of interest such as bird watching areas and historic sites, any use restrictions, trailheads, access points. This map could be adapted to a print version.

- T2 Epworth (1st and Calvert St)– Epworth Park history
- T3 Pioneers Blvd Floodplain, flood protection, Salt Creek channelization
- T4 1st Street Plants of Wilderness Park
- T5 Old Cheney Rd Pre-European Settlement history
- T6 the Great Plains Trails Network Connector Birds of Wilderness Park
- T7 14th Street Animals of Wilderness Park
- T8 Saltillo Rd Village of Jamaica and the Fort Kearney Cutoff of the Oregon Trail


Navigational signage: located on trails at intersections

Color/Shape coded – three trail colors Red Circle, Yellow Square, Blue Triangle; correspond to colors on map. Options could include:

Simplest: Tells you which trail you are on.

Simple: Tells you which trail you are on and how far to the next trailhead





Add standard street signs when going under roadway to let people know where they are. – Pioneers Blvd, Old Cheney Rd, Warlick Blvd

Trail rule signs: located at entries to trails, Trailheads or from JNT, BT, SCLT or other entries
